In order for the recycling system to be as productive as possible, it is imperative that we "Recycle Right!" Please heed these top 5 tips and follow the new Guiddines on page 11. When in doubt, check out the online guide for more detail or call me!

- Recycle only empty containers: plastic (bottles, tubs, jugs, jars), glass (bottles, jars), and metal (cans): cartons: paper; and flattened cardboard in your curbside cart.
- 2. Keep all food and liquids out of the recycling
- 3. Empty recyclables loose into your cart NO bagged recyclables!
- 4. Do not recycle any objects that are not paper, cardboard or containers. Period.
- Shredded paper should not go in your curbside cart. It is just too difficult to
 capture and makes a mess at the sorting facility. See page 2 for shred event
 dates & page 11 for best practices.

If you are an avid reader of this guide you may have noticed that I've recycled this headline from the 2016 edition. "Minimize Waste" is the most important message I have. Our resource consumption continues to increase, making it paramount that we reassess our purchasing habits and be more selective concerning the packaging of our products. Aim for zero waste and see how close you can get!

In order for the recycling system to be as productive as possible, it is imperative that we "Recycle Right!" Please heed these top 5 tips and follow the new Guidelines on page 11. When in doubt, check out the online guide for more detail or call me!

- Recycle only empty containers: plastic (bottles, tubs, jugs, jars), glass (bottles, jars), and metal (cans); cartons; paper; and flattened cardboard in your curbside cart.
- 2. Keep all food and liquids out of the recycling.
- 3. Empty recyclables loose into your cart NO bagged recyclables!
- 4. Do not recycle any objects that are not paper, cardboard or containers. Period.
- 5. Shredded paper should not go in your curbside cart. It is just too difficult to capture and makes a mess at the sorting facility. See page 2 for shred event dates & page 11 for best practices.

New Recycling Guidelines

Recycle Paper & Containers in your curbside collection cart (loose; not bagged):



Paper

Office paper, newspaper, magazines, and flattened cardboard.



Glass

Bottles and jars. Empty and rinse.



Cartons

Food and beverage cartons. Empty, rinse, and replace cap.



Plastic

Plastic bottles, tubs, jugs, and jars. Empty, rinse, and replace cap.



Metal

Aluminum and steel beverage/food cans. Empty and rinse.

NEW Guidelines Poster

Do **NOT** include in your recycling cart:



NO plastic bags or soft plastic film

Recycle clean, dry, empty bags at grocery stores. Find a recycling site at plasticfilmrecycling.org.



NO shredded paper

Shredded paper causes major problems at sorting facilities. Best Practice is to tear off the confidential potion, and recycle the rest of the sheet whole. OR save it and bring it to a Shred Event (see pg 2).



If the box top is clean you can tear it off and recycle it. Bottoms (or tops) with ANY grease, cheese or food on them go in the trash.



NO propane tanks, medical waste

No pressurized containers or medical waste like needles or syringes (see HHW p. 4-5).



NO food waste or liquids

Block packaging, cups,

Take to Dart Container

Corp (see A-Z list p. 8-10).

Compost instead.

NO foam

and containers.



Pizza boxes



NO cups, lids or straws

No take-away cups (plastic, paper, or foam), no plastic lids, no straws. These all go in the trash.



NO frozen food boxes

They are made of a hybrid of wet-strength paper and plastic that is not recyclable. These all go in the trash.



NO Tanglers

No cords, hoses, hangers, wires, string, etc. which get caught in the sorting machinery and cause problems. These go in the trash.



NO candy wrappers or snack bags

Candy wrappers and chip bags are made of plastic that is not recyclable. These all go in the trash.

Old Recycling Guidelines

Recycling Guidelines Single-stream Recycling Guidelines for Home and for Work

Containers

Aluminum Cans and Foil

- Aluminum cans (please empty, do not crush or flatten)
- Aluminum foil (ball clean foil to 2 inches or larger, no flat foil or small balled up foil)
- Pie plates & trays (must be free of food)

- Food cans and lids (please empty and rinse, place lids in the can and lightly pinch the top closed, labels
- Metal paint cans and lids (must be empty and dry, some dried paint residue is fine)
- Empty aerosol cans (nozzles and labels can be left on)
- Metal bottle caps are recyclable (place in recycling loose)
- NO utensils, propane tanks, wire hangers, or small appliances

 Milk, Juice, and Soup cartons and boxes (please empty and rinse, do not crush or flatten, plastic nozzles and tabs can be left on)

Glass Bottles and Jars

- All colors are accepted (Please empty and rinse, labels can be left on, and avoid breaking the glass. Remove caps and put metal caps in the recycling separately, throw plastic caps in the trash. Plastic caps are recyclable only if attached to plastic bottles or jars, see below)
- NO window or auto glass, bakeware, ceramics, mirrors, light bulbs, coffee pots or

- the item is recyclable; it just tells you what type of plastic it is. Please follow the guidelines below and recycle by item shape rather than the number on it.
- Bottles (i.e. empty water, soda, juice bottles; empty squeezable containers; laundry detergent, soap, shampoo bottles; empty health and beauty products; cleaners) Replace plastic screw-top caps n empty plastic bottles and jars to recycle them.
- Tubs (i.e. coffee, tofu, cottage cheese, yogurt, margarine tubs) No lids.
- Jugs (i.e. milk and juice jugs)
- Jars (i.e. mayo jars) Replace plastic screw-top caps on empty plastic bottles and jars.
- Boxes (i.e. fruit or lettuce boxes)
- Buckets, pails (Buckets up to 5 gallons, pails without the metal handles)
- Other narrow neck containers (i.e. kitty litter containers)
- . DO NOT RECYCLE flat plastic lids (from yogurt tubs or lettuce boxes); black plastic of any shape; plastic bags or film (see Plastic Bag Recycling box); plastic utensils or plates; plastic wraps, sandwich bags, freezer bags, tarps; plastic toys; hard plastic packaging; candy wrappers, cereal bags, potato chip bags, or snack bags; empty motor oil bottles; Styrofoam or polystyrene (See A-Z list).

See the A-Z list (pg 8-9 et 12) for a list of all the other things you can recycle in Kane County that don't go in your curbside bin.

Paper

- Newspaper and inserts
- Magazines, catalogs, and phone books Office paper, notebooks (staples, spirals, metal clips are okay), computer print outs, hanging file folders, pastel colored sticky notes, glossy
- brochures, index cards, greeting cards, stationary, fax paper, manila folders and envelopes (cellophane windows are ok to leave in) Junk mail (please remove all non-paper: plastic cards, magnets, etc)
- Chipboard/paperboard cereal, cracker, or frozen food boxes, tissue, shoe, gift, and 6/12-pack boxes, paper towel tubes, and egg cartons
- Cardboard boxes must be flattened and cut to 3' x 3'
- Brown paper grocery bags Paperback books (no hardcover books)
- Pizza boxes A little bit of grease will not hurt the recycling process, so if the box has only a few grease spots, you can recycle the whole thing! If there is cheese or grease on the bottom of the box, rip the box in half and recycle the relatively clean top and put the bottom portion in the trash.
- Shredded Paper Loose shredded paper causes major sorting problems in the Recycling Facility, so please find out how your waste hauler (p1) recommends packaging it for recycling. Some suggest inclosing it in paper bags, some in clear plastic bags
- NO used paper plates or fluorescent paper (they contaminate the paper stream with food or dye)
- NO paper towels, tissues, or napkins, which are not recyclable because they are usually soiled and also the fibers are too small to reuse (please compost them with kitchen food scraps if possible)

Close the Loop

Buying products with recycled content is the next step in creating a sustainable closed loop system. Look for household paper products like tissues, toilet paper, and paper towels that have recycled fiber content, otherwise they are made directly from trees! Office paper is available with 10% to 100% post-consumer recycled content, which means it was made out of paper that was milled and manufactured, purchased, used, recycled, and then remanufactured, to be used again!

Recycling Plastic Bags and Plastic Film

Please do not place plastic bags or film in your household recycling! They are recyclable but only at grocery store drop-boxes. Check your local store for their drop-box and to verify acceptable materials. Please visit www.plastic filmtecycling.org for more information. Please Recycle only plastic bags that are clean, dry and empty.

- · Grocery bass Retail bags
- (hard plastic and string bandles removed)
- Paper towel and toilet paper plastic wrap
- Plastic newspaper bass
- Plastic dry cleaning bags
- All clean, clear bread bags labeled with a #2 or #4
- Ziploc bags (clean, dry empty bags only & cut the zip strip off)

Do NOT Recycles The following are considered consuminants and

- could jeopardize recycling programs:
- NO receipts, deli stickers, or ding wrap NO frozen food bags
- NO film that has been painted or has excessive glue
- NO bio-based or compostable plastic bars

- Cardboard boxes must be flattened and cut to 3'x3'
- Brown paper grocery bags
- Paperback books (no hardcover books)
- NO used paper plates or pizza boxes, or fluorescent paper (they contaminate the paper stream with food. dye, or plastic coating) If pizza box top is clean you can tear it off and recycle it.
- NO paper towels, tissues, or napkins, which are not recyclable because the fibers are too small to reuse (please compost them with kitchen food scraps if (aldisenn
- NO Shredded Paper Loose shredded paper causes major sorting problems in the Recycling Facility, so please save your documents for a shred event or best practice is to tear off the confidential portion and recycle the rest of the sheet whole.
- NO frozen food boxes, which are made of a hybrid of paper and plastic, and are not wanted by paper mills
- NO paper cups, which are also made of a hybrid of paper and plastic rendering them unrecyclable.

- NO window or auto glass, bakeware, ceramics, mirrors, light bulbs, coffee pots or drinking glasses

PLASTIC CONTAINERS

- BOTTLES (i.e. empty water, soda, juice bottles, empty laundry detergent, soap and shampoo bottles, empty health and beauty products and cleaner bottles) Replace plastic screw top caps on empty plastic
- TUBS (i.e. empty coffee, tofu, cottage cheese, yogurt, margarine tubs)
- JUGS (i.e. empty milk and juice jugs)
- JARS (ie. empty mayo and peanut butter jars) Replace plastic screw top lids on empty plastic jars NO plastic bags (do not put in the curbside bin, see

RECYCLING GUIDELINES

Residential curbside collection programs are managed by municipalities and townships in Kane County. For service issues, please contact either your hauler or your city directly. Residents in unincorporated areas may contract for services with any licensed hauler.

These single-stream recycling guidelines apply to households, businesses, schools and institutions.

We unload for you: Please stay in your car if possible.

Books: Books can be of any age, in any condition, either paperback or hard cover. They are assessed for reuse and redistributed if possible. Otherwise they are sent for recycling.

Document Shredding: Free confidential document shredding on specific dates listed above.

- This service provides on-site shredding trucks.
- . Staples, paperclips, spiral bindings, file folders without metal, and envelope windows are fine to leave in. Please REMOVE all binder clips, three-ring plastic binders and any larger
- Please do not bring periodicals, magazines, and other paper that does not contain confidential information.
- We will receive documents for shredding only until the trucks are full, and may finish before 12pm.
- Quantity limit is approximately equal to 4 banker boxes full of residential documents.
- Documents from businesses will not be accepted.

Electronics: See list of acceptable and non-acceptable items on page 3. All data stored on computer hard drives will be completely erased or destroyed under the highest security (meeting all FACTA privacy protection requirements), so there is no need to wipe your drives before recycling at this event.

EXTRAVAGANZA: At the annual extravaganza we take Electronics; Books; Bikes, parts, & helmets; 4-foot fluorescent tubes; Clothes, paired shoes; Styrofoam blocks and food service ware; Paint (per-can fee applies, see below), and we offer free Confidential document shredding. Check online in June for a full updated list of what we'll be taking.

Paint Recycling: Paint recycling is offered on specific dates listed above.

- Latex paint has a recycling fee per container, payable by the resident with cash or check (Quart \$2; Gallon \$3.50; 2-gallon \$5.50; 5-gallon \$10) only at event dates specified above
- Oil Paint is now also accepted for a fee per container, payable by the resident with cash or check (Gallon \$6; 2-gallon \$9; 5-gallon \$25) only at event dates specified above.


